#### NatureCounts App – new and improved!

If you haven't checked out the NatureCounts App for a while (or never!) then you'll be delighted- over the past two years it has undergone extensive testing and upgrades and we couldn't be more excited about its utility. The "new and improved" app got rave reviews at our kick-off events this past month and we hope you'll all give it a try.

Version 4.3.4 was released in April so make sure you've updated. Some of the new features include:

- Safe dates are now built right into the app
- Warning pops up if you leave a square
- Built in timer
- Ability to download draft checklists
- Quick entry (type a number then the species name or four letter code to quickly add that number to the species' total)
- · Better syncing with eBird locations

# Digital point counts now online!

Over the first two years of the Atlas, almost 3,000 digital point counts were conducted across the province. These have now all been analyzed and the results incorporated into the Atlas, check out the map below!

Anyone can conduct digital point counts and the digital recorders are available for loan from most regional coordinators. Please check-in with your RC to arrange to borrow a unit and find out where your help would be most useful if you'd like to conduct some this summer.



## **Photos needed**

Even though we've still got three field seasons to go, we're already starting to think about the publication of the results and one of the things we will need are photos. So, we're giving you a heads-up that our August challenge will be related to submitting media to us through our <u>media submission</u> form.

So this summer when you're out, please carry a camera and document what you find. We'll be asking for photos showing breeding evidence, birds, habitats and Atlassers in action. If you do, you'll be well-positioned to participate (and maybe win!) the August monthly challenge.

## Join us on a square bash this summer!

Square-bashes are enjoyable, multi-day events, bringing together atlassers with all levels of experience from across the province to focus their efforts on key coverage gaps focused around Provincial Parks. Thanks to Ontario Parks for generously providing free camping for square-bash participants. Last year's events were a great success and we're hoping to build on that in 2023.

You could come for the entire duration of the event, or just part of that time. Our goal is to provide adequate coverage for as many squares as we can in and around the parks, while having as much fun as possible. Square bashes are a ton of fun and a great opportunity for new and seasoned Atlassers alike.

We have three planned square bashes:

- <u>MacGregor Point Provincial Park</u>: Monday May 29 Friday June 2, 2023. This event ties in with the <u>Huron Fringe Birding Festival</u> which runs on the adjacent weekends. The Huron Fringe is a beautiful area at the southern end of the Bruce Peninsula with among the highest number of breeding species anywhere in the province, from Golden-winged Warblers to Upland Sandpipers to Broad-winged Hawks. If you're heading to the Festival, consider adding a few days onto your trip and help out the Atlas or just come for the Square-bash.

- <u>Sharbot Lake Provincial Park</u>: Friday June 2 Wednesday June 7. At last, a square-bash event in southeastern Ontario! This event takes place in the rich amalgam of habitat along the edge of the Canadian Shield, and is particularly convenient for atlassers from the Kingston and Ottawa areas. It's right in the core of the Golden-winged Warbler range with Cerulean Warblers and many others a definite possibility. <u>REGISTER HERE</u>.
- French River Provincial Park: Friday June 9 Friday June 16. This will be a canoe-based trip along the historic French River in one of the province's most gorgeous landscapes at the northeast corner of Georgian Bay. The area is rich in Common Nighthawks and Eastern Whip-poor-wills, Sandhill Cranes, boreal warblers and too many others to list. <u>REGISTER HERE</u>.

Please do not contact the parks or the Huron Fringe festival about these square-bash events. Arrangements are made through the Atlas-3 office. Be sure to register with the links above even if you only plan to come for part of a day.

#### Single-day square bash in Parry Sound

There is also a single-day square bash in the Parry Sound region, in square 17TNL82, taking place Saturday May 27 from 9am - 12pm. We will pair experienced birders with novice birders to ID birds by sight & sound, all experience levels are welcome.
